How Does a Person Become Catholic?

Years ago, if a person was interested in becoming Catholic, he or she would meet with a priest, receive instruction concerning aspects of the faith, and after a period of time, be baptized privately or received into the Church. That person became another face in the crowd at Sunday Mass. Realizing that we are a faith family, a community of believers, the Church has changed its approach to bringing new members into the community.

Conversion, not instruction: Becoming a Catholic is an important decision in a person's life requiring much thought and prayer. Coming to the Catholic Church is a person's response to an invitation made by Jesus to know Him through His Church, the sacraments, and community. Conversion describes the process of coming to know Him more deeply and be in relationship with Him. While we learn many facts of the Church in RCIA (Why do Catholics genuflect? What is going to confession all about? Why do Catholics pray to Mary?) and these things are important, it is the relationship with Christ which we hope to nurture and support.

A process, not a program: Once again, RCIA is best described as a process of coming into relationship with Jesus on a personal level. Everything to know about Him could not fit into an eight month instruction program or a lifetime for that matter. In RCIA, we realize that there is a space in our hearts that only Christ can fill and that our faith will be what we make of it. This is a new beginning on our life's journey with Him.

Public, not private: The process of becoming Catholic involves ceremonies called "rites" that take place during certain Sunday liturgies. The public nature of these rites is important because we are a community of believers. Those who are already Catholic pray for and support those on the path towards initiation and those who are in RCIA remind all of us to be more committed to ongoing conversion in our own lives.
